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Relative clauses (things)

Rule

You use a **relative clause** to add details to a noun. A relative clause does not make sense as a sentence on its own.

When the noun is an animal or a thing, you introduce the relative clause using one of these relative pronouns: which, that, when or where. For example:

- The horse, which was a beautiful chestnut colour, jumped over the fence.
- Maeve let me borrow the book that she bought this morning.
- Tuesday is the day **when** we have visitors arriving.
- This is the church **where** my grandparents got married.

You can sometimes miss out the relative pronoun, especially in speech. For example:

- Toby is eating a huge burger (which is) surrounded by chips.
- Have you lost the key (that) I gave you this morning?
- That's the week (when) I've got a dentist's appointment.
- This is the restaurant (where) we first met.



abc

clause: a group of words that contains a subject and a verb. One or more clauses is used to build up a sentence.

noun: a word used to name a place, a person, a thing or an idea, for example: *leg*, *Scotland*, *woman*, *sadness*

relative clause: a clause that adds details to a noun but does not make sense on its own

relative pronoun: a word used to refer back to a noun,

for example: who, that, whose
