

# Before and during reading

#### Comprehension

Ask the children to look at the cover and read the title. What sort of book do they think this is: a story or an information book? How can they tell? What do they think it will be about? Ask them to be perfectly silent for 30 seconds and to listen to the sounds around them. Talk about what they can hear. (NB: When introducing and reading this book, be sensitive to those children who may have hearing difficulties.)

#### Vocabulary check

Check that the children understand the meaning of the following words: pair, alike, different, brain, throat, goo, moist. What other words or phrases for 'pure rubbish' (page II) can they think of.

#### **Reading the story**

- Listen to the children reading the book. Ask them to say the sounds and blend them in order to read words they do not recognise immediately.
- As they read, draw children's attention to headings and labels. Ask the children what job headings and labels do. How are they different? How do they help us?
- On pages 4 and 5, check that the children understand the process of how we hear. Talk about the job of the diagram. How does it help them to understand the process better?

Blending more than one syllable? Do one syllable at a time, e.g. ear/drum.

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# After reading

#### Comprehension

- Ask the children to describe how the ear works so that we hear sounds.
- Why do we have small hairs in our ears?
- Why do ears contain wax? What do you think might happen if there is too much wax?
- Do all animals have ears? Which page gives you the answer to this question?
- What can a cat do with its ears that a human can't?

- True or false? Earwigs are tiny creatures that live in your ears.
- What is the most interesting new fact you found out by reading this book?

## Speedy reading

Return to the words on the inside front cover ('Blend the sounds') and check that children can sound out and blend these words confidently. Ask them to practise blending them until they can read them quickly.

> Don't necessarily do all of the activities – just those that your children need.




Not all ears look alike. Look at all the different ears.


