What support will there be?

How can you teach history when there is no shared consensus about what happened, why it happened or how events should be explained or interpreted? This is particularly problematic when a conflict is ongoing and still being experienced.

Rather than teaching a single view which tries to accommodate elements of both communities' views, a dual narrative approach presents students with two different historical perspectives. By engaging with both narratives, they learn how and why histories are constructed. The narratives are supported by a carefully selected group of sources that students can explore and interrogate to help them assess and argue about the two narratives.

The resources are being developed with input from a group of Pioneer schools to ensure they are easy for teachers to use in the classroom and suitable for a wide range of students.

I think the Parallel Histories approach, encouraging investigation through inclusion of sources, makes so much sense both because it will enhance understanding of how the narratives have been formed and is fair to both perspectives.

What is the dual narrative approach?




An **auto-marked knowledge quiz** at the end of each unit to check understanding and aid revision.

In addition, Unit 12 contains dedicated exam advice for tackling each question, including advice on how to integrate the dual narrative approach to meet the requirements of the Edexcel exam.

What is coming, and when?
